Letter from the Minister

Dear Friends

The Kirk Sessions have agreed to support the twinning of Lothian Presbytery with the East Himalaya Diocese of the Church of North India. The twinning arrangement has been in place since February 2000, having been suggested by the World Mission Council. A substantial number of missionaries had gone from East Lothian to north India over many years; more than from any other single Presbytery. At the heart of the twinning arrangement is the intention that as many congregations as possible within the Presbytery should be twinned with congregations in the diocese, the hope being that strong links could be forged at this level involving a mutual exchange of information, prayer and support. In 2017 / 2018, while I was serving as World Mission Convener in Presbytery, we undertook a review of the twinning and recognised that more could and should be done to give it life and energy. Visitors to the diocese from the Presbytery, during that time, brought news of several congregations in the diocese wishing to establish links. Presbytery is actively seeking congregations to take up these invitations. It cannot be denied that communication with some of these very rural congregations can be sporadic due to infrastructure and logistical difficulties, but persistence can pay off.

Gullane has now been twinned with Jaigaon Pastorate and Aberlady with Kumargram Pastorate. I propose to launch these partnerships at our United Service on Transfiguration Sunday, 3 March 2019. This will be held in Gullane at 10.30am. There is also a possibility that we might be able to host some visitors from the Diocese at our United Service in Aberlady on 5 May 2019. Should anyone, in either congregation, feel that they might help with correspondence and building up the links then I will be pleased to hear from you.

This edition of the magazine is the last before Lent and Easter. I have included as much detail as I can now, regarding Holy Week and Easter services. It is a joy to know that we will be joined on Good Friday by the folk of St Adrian's Episcopal congregation.

Easter 2019: I also hope that there will be opportunities in Lent to participate in ecumenical groups, with prayer, study and discussion. Please watch the service sheets and notice-boards for information on this.

Palm Sunday Hymn

Ride on! Ride on in majesty!
Hark, all the tribes hosannas cry;
Thine humble beast pursues his road
With palms and scattered garments strewed.

This very fine Palm Sunday hymn was written by Henry Milman who was successively vicar of St Mary's, Reading, St Margaret's, Westminster, and Dean of St Paul's Cathedral. He was born in Westminster, the son of Sir Francis Milman, physician to King George III, and was educated at Eton and Oxford. It was while he was at St Mary's Church in 1821 that he wrote 'Ride on! Ride on in Majesty' and when it was finished he sent a copy to Reginald Heber, who at that time was compiling a book of hymns to cover all the Sundays and festivals of the Christian year. He received an enthusiastic reply from Heber in the words, "You have indeed sent me a most powerful reinforcement to my projected hymn book". When the hymn book was published it was given as the first hymn for Palm Sunday and has been a regular feature of worship on that day ever since.

For some reason the third line of the first verse was regarded as unacceptable by hymn book editors and was changed to 'O Saviour meek, pursue thy road' which appears in our current hymn book and with which we are familiar.

The tune most commonly sung to the hymn is Winchester New, also known as Frankfurt, as it first appeared in Hamburg in 1690 as the setting for a German hymn. It appears to have been introduced to England by John Wesley in the 1740s and was called a 'swift German tune'.

East Lothian Foodbank

I first became involved with the Foodbank during my time as Headteacher at Yester Primary. The pupils on our Pupil Council wanted to collect food items for the Foodbank at our Harvest Assembly and so I arranged to take them up to see how it all worked. They took photographs and then presented to the rest of the school and parents and managed to collect lots of food - the children doing this themselves had much more impact than I would!

At that time the Foodbank was just starting and because of that and fewer referrals being made it was quite small scale. In December I became a volunteer and was quite overwhelmed by the size and scale of it all now. I was also very impressed with the organisation and enthusiasm of staff and volunteers. You know from Rachel's updates on numbers using the service but I wondered if it would be of interest to know what happens.

Food comes in from many different sources, churches like ourselves, organisations, shop collections and individuals who ring the bell at the Foodbank and drop off bags of food. When food is delivered it is weighed. The food is then sorted into categories and arranged into trays according to expiry dates. Huge shelves are all around the room (an old library) and the trays are stored here. Once a referral comes in bags are made up according to the number of people in a family and contain a set list giving people a good selection of items eg tinned meat, fish, fruit, veg. Referrals can only be made by professionals eg Social Work, Doctors, Health Visitors, Head teachers etc and people can only be referred a certain number of times within a six month period except in exceptional circumstances. The bags are then weighed. (there are recommendations about the weight of food a certain family number can get to ensure fairness), labelled and stored ready to be delivered. This is when you see first hand how important food parcels are

to people and how appreciative they are when they receive them.

So please don't stop getting a few extra items when you do your weekly shop and dropping them into the boxes at the front door and be assured that what you do is making a real difference to lots of people across East Lothian, and if you are interested in becoming a volunteer I know you will find it a worthwhile use of a few hours of your time.

..and Rachel's most recent update :

The end of the year has been exceptionally busy in the Foodbank. The numbers just keep going up and up. The amount of emergency food parcels handed out has gone from an average of 166 per month last year, to 193 per month this past year. November 2018 saw 245 referrals for food parcels and in December there were 259. Musselburgh receives 32% of parcels but North Berwick coastal area still gets 8%.

In December, in addition to the emergency food parcels, we distributed Jingle bags too, 328 bags were given out across the county. These bags contained everything one might need to put together a Christmas Day meal, including crackers too until we ran out. It has been a mammoth operation but well supported by the community. In December, including donations from Tesco, the Foodbank received over 20,000kgs of food, all needing sorted, but all very gratefully received.

Please continue to give to the Foodbank, both donations of food and money are very gratefully received. There are staff and rent to pay as well as tummies to fill. You will find up to date information at <https://eastlothian.foodbank.org.uk>



A Five Day Trip to Israel

Off we set from Manchester to Tel Aviv, Barry my son-in-law and I, to meet up with my granddaughter Lucy who was flying from London to join us. There should have been four intrepid travellers but sadly my daughter Kandy was not very well so couldn't join us.

What an adventure – our hotel was 300 metres from the ancient walled city of Jerusalem. I had to pinch myself to believe that I was really there in the Holy Land.

Perhaps a lot of people like me have preconceived ideas of what Israel should be like – shades of the past, memories of bible stories and Sunday School are tucked away in our more realistic adult minds. I was however very aware, despite the crowds, when the “still small voice of calm” made its presence felt. Once such moment occurred as we stood at the bottom of the Via Dolorosa and put our hand in the imprint of the hand of Jesus who, it is said, leaned for a moment on his way to Calvary. Another was Lucy and I spreading our hands on the Wailing (Western) Wall and joining in a prayer together.

We walked up the Via Dolorosa to the Holy Church of the Sepulchre which is the site of the empty tomb. We climbed the Mount of Olives, we sat in the Garden of Gethsemane and wondered at the magnificence of the Temple Mount, its golden dome and the peaceful surrounds. We sought spirituality amongst the crowds and were moved when we managed to find it.

Palestinian guides took us to the West Bank – Hebron, Ramallah and of course Bethlehem. We were taken to the refugee camp in Bethlehem where our guide Mustapha lived. Mustapha showed us the enormous concrete separation wall and the controversial graffiti by the renowned Banksy (who described the separation wall as the “ultimate canvas”). Whilst in Bethlehem we visited the Church of the Holy Nativity which even at 5pm was heaving with people queuing to kneel at the birth place of Jesus.

A detail which exemplifies the multi-faith and secularity of where we were was the use of BCE (Before Common Era) and CE to replace BC and AD at historic sites. I'd always

assumed they were universally used but of course that is from a Western European and Christian perspective.

Despite the wonders of it all, we were disquieted by the army presence, the police, the check-points and the watchtowers. The security is pervasive and the atmosphere palpable - a country divided.

However, we unlikely trio had a wonderful time together. After our busy days there were lots of nice restaurants within walking distance of our hotel. (Lucy and Barry particularly enjoyed the Lamb Sharwarma). I feel enriched by our experience which I will never forget.

Small Repairs Service

This is a professional service which carries out small repairs to the home and is available to home owners and private tenants of 60 or over and to those with a disability aged 50 or over. It operates through funding from East Lothian Council with NO charge for labour, just for the materials used.

The works undertaken are largely joiner based including new door locks, safety chains, grab rails, curtain rails, shelving and draught proofing. Outside works include replacing rotten window sills, providing handrails, keysafe installations and small glazing jobs.

Some electrical works are also available including electrical home safety checks, installing or replacing security lights, replacing faulty sockets/lights/bulbs, replacing/repairing doorbells, repair of storage panel heaters and extractor fans (not cooker hoods).

The service does not undertake plumbing, decorating or gardening work, nor is it able to help if you are selling or planning to sell your house.

Additionally the service can offer help and advice on larger repairs, maintenance and improvements including assistance in finding suitable contractors and providing help and support throughout the work.

Not many of you will know that as well as being the Church roll keeper and fabric convenor that I have taken on the role as Chair for the local Day Care Centre adjacent to our very modern Medical Centre. The Gullane Day Centre was founded by Peter and Paula Jackson and relocated 4 years ago into its ultra modern facility overlooking our tennis courts.

We operate from Monday to Thursday 51 weeks per year with totally dedicated staff and some fantastic volunteers. Our staff are all fully qualified and have regular training to ensure the proper safety and health wellness of all. Also if any problems do arise, we have immediate access to the medical centre.

The Day Centre is one of 10 in East Lothian that provide so many benefits to the elderly providing health and social care in a warm, fun environment.

We have top quality transport to collect members from their homes in Aberlady, Drem, Dirleton and Gullane. On arrival at the centre tea, coffee and refreshments are provided together with social exercises and fun relationships.

A hot two-course meal is provided at lunchtime and the afternoons are taken up with musical entertainment, quizzes and support from many groups including our local primary children. We also have a church service for special occasions taken by our Minister.

The positives for the community are fairly obvious in that members are meeting up regularly with old and new friends. They are trying new activities and getting a real buzz socially. So many show such a huge improvement in their well-being and cannot wait for their next visits. It also gives a break for home carers and gives families total peace of mind.

One of the centres has an 80+ year old member who had never painted before but has now taken up watercolour painting with a very keen eye for detail.

There is a welcome to anyone to come and join in with our activities as we are always seeking help on a daily basis. We find there is excellent feedback from working with our members. We are always looking for new ideas.

Financially we are supported by the local council and have proved the massive benefits it gives to ensure that members can continue to stay in their own homes in familiar surroundings. We are well assisted by a number of charities and fund raisers who help us to provide additional benefits with media and technical support and entertainment.

With us all living in an ever ageing population the benefits given from Day Centres is likely to become even more important in the future.

So please do come in and see us and enjoy a cuppa and a chat. You will love it and just might find you would like to volunteer to help us with our exciting group. You might also know of a neighbour or friend who might benefit from joining us.

Thank you for taking time to digest my dialogue.

We provide a superb service to our members and we all enjoy working with so many interesting members and friends in our community.
