A message from our locum minister:

As I type this, I am aware that it is now the month of May and will soon be into June obviously, but less obvious might be that it was in June that I was appointed as the Locum Minister here in Aberlady and Gullane.

Much has happened in that time, many changes for people to adapt to. Thankfully whilst Covid case numbers remain high the restrictions continue to become more relaxed. I pray you have been able to avoid Covid but if not have recovered well. There have been changes in the management of the Church affairs here too. The Interim Moderator, Rev Robin Allison, has stood down due to other commitments and Rev Jock Stein has been appointed in his place. Thankfully the week-by-week services are still covered by myself which I am enjoying. I also enjoy the opportunity to meet with people when I can and look forward to being able to once more come to Aberlady with our motorhome as that makes visiting a lot more convenient as there is very little travel involved.

We welcome you and yours to join us in our services as I equally welcome the opportunity to visit folks as my time limits dictate (I am only appointed for 2 days per week). In particular I look forward to meeting with family and friends of the couples getting married over the summer and pray the weather is good for us all.

There was an intimation in church just last week about the food bank and I was suggesting people might take a few seconds to look at their food, laid out before them, as they sit down to eat and that might lead them to consider providing an equivalent to their meat to the food bank. A simple act that in itself may be a change from your normal practice but change is not necessarily a bad thing. Even if we feel led to do this once per week or once per day the food bank which is presently struggling might better supply the needs of the many who rely on it to be able heat the house and feed the family. It is after all a sad incitement on one of the richest nations in the world that we have men women and children going to bed hungry, particularly if like many households some food ends up in the bin as it has gone out of date.

I also recognise that as holiday options are also opening up again there is an increased risk of infections as we travel. My prayer for one and all it that the summer is a good one and that you will all remain safe.

The Church of Scotland is very busy at the moment. On April 28th Presbytery discussed their 'Mission Plan', an attempt to do more with less. You will know that Aberlady and Gullane have already started negotiations towards a union, which is likely to be one of the easier outcomes of the plan. It will also mean that we are allocated 'half a minister'; it is never easy finding a minister, but in an age of portfolio working it may be easier to find a half-time minister than it once was.

One of the signs of any society out of kilter, is that some are grossly overworked (as currently in the NHS) and others lack meaningful work to do. And of course there may be personal issues of 'overdrive' and laziness. We heard of someone recently visiting Pluscarden Abbey, which is an old Benedictine monastery near Elgin dating from 1230. The Abbot greeted him warmly, and asked him how he was. "I'm busy," he replied.

"Oh, I'm so sorry!" said the Abbot.

It's worth reflecting on the difference between business and busyness. Not always simple, as Jesus found when he tried to take his friends away for a wee retreat, and they got interrupted. Sometimes our only refuge is a place of stillness in our hearts, where the Lord quietens the storm – but if you have other opportunities this summer, may they bless and renew you.

There is much to discuss and the timetable is largely governed by Lothian Presbytery and 121 George Street. We have had great support from Rev Graham Duffin, who is leading Lothian Presbytery's restructuring efforts and we will be moderated by our new Interim Moderator, Rev Jock Stein, going forward. Importantly, both Gullane and Aberlady churches will remain open to worship on Sundays. We have scheduled a full meeting of joint Kirk Sessions in June to take this further.
