

PRESBYTERY LETTER

The following letter was written by Norman Smith, Presbytery Clerk, after the Presbytery meeting on 28th October.

Hello everyone,

Yesterday I spent the entire day in 121 so apologies for missing Monday for sending out our weekly email.

It was a very interesting day, considering what happens next in terms of the national church. We all know our congregational attendance is not what it was and we would be foolish to think with a snap of our fingers we could recapture the past. Some of the consequences of where we are now include less people involved as congregational leaders, whether minister, elder or a.n.other. Less finance available because fewer people give less so fewer people carry a greater financial burden for most congregations. A reduced impact in the public square, at one point the church was the center of village/town life but that is much less the case. All in all the place of the church is very different today to what we mostly knew growing up.

The people gathered there recognised our calling was not actually to recapture the church as it was but to discover the church as it is going to be. What does it mean to live for God in today and tomorrow's world?

There was a lot of discussion, a lot of contemplation but not a lot of clarity as people grappled with the many issues. No doubt there will be more meetings in the future and no doubt some of the thoughts will come to future General Assemblies for consideration. One of the most interesting things about the day was the variety of people who came from different theological and ecclesiological perspectives. Yet all there wanted to see the Kingdom of God grow in Scotland in the 21st century.

Look around your own church and see the variety of people who gather each week. We are not the same, we are united in Christ. As a Presbytery we reflect this in Standing Order number 1, the rules that govern our Presbytery meetings.

1. Presbyters are reminded we are first and foremost a gathering of brothers and sisters under the headship of Jesus Christ and though at times we may disagree, that which holds us together is stronger than anything which may divide us.

Please join me in giving thanks this week that our God appeals to all people, is relevant to all people and all people can find faith in him.

East Lothian Foodbank

Having recently attended East Lothian Foodbank's AGM I thought I would share with you some of the information they presented. To me, the Foodbank always seems so busy, sorting food coming in, packing parcels and distributing them. It was good to hear of all the hard work going on in the background too. The information here covers the period April 2023 – March 2024.

What isn't mentioned is that the foodbank benefits from the help of 114 volunteers. Those volunteers have put in 7,100 hours in the warehouse, have driven 99,400 hours, and have shifted 126 tonnes of food and essentials.

Aberlady and Gullane Parish Church collected 116kg of provisions for the Foodbank at our Harvest Thanksgiving services. This amount equates to 10x one/two person parcels or 5x family parcels. We also received some cash donations.

Please continue to donate to your local foodbank. Food, toiletries and household cleaning products can be left at either church on Sunday mornings, at Gullane library or COOP, also Aberlady Community Hall when open. Donations can also be left at Tesco in North Berwick and/or Tranent and will be taken to the warehouse in Tranent.

"It's about being remembered..."

I have to admit that, for a variety of reasons, my church attendance has slipped somewhat this year. Life can take some strange twists sometimes. However, there is always some light amidst darkness, and, amongst many unbelievably simultaneous tragic and distressing episodes for our families recently, one activity has brightened my life this year.

Some years ago, a group of daughters and sons of RAF pilots, like my father, who trained at Falcon Field, Mesa Arizona, USA, during World War 2 got together, determined to preserve the memory of these brave young men. Not many people realise that thousands of WW2 pilots had to train abroad, because conditions in the UK – poor weather and enemy action – did not allow them to fulfil the necessary flying hours quickly enough here, where they were desperately needed. Six British Flying Training Schools were established in the USA, Falcon Field, Arizona, being No4BFTS.

For the past 4 years, we have arranged get-togethers, at Bentley Priory (wartime HQ of Fighter Command), the RAF Museum at Hendon, and the Imperial War Museum, Duxford.

This year, we arranged our gathering at the National Memorial Arboretum, (NMA) Alrewas, near Birmingham, Staffordshire, where we achieved a cherished objective: to place a plaque in the RAF grove there, to serve as a permanent memorial to those ordinary, mostly 18 and 19 year old young men, who braved crossings of the Atlantic, avoiding UBoats, to train as pilots and return to fight for their country.

The day dawned grey and dull, and, as we avoided puddles in the car park, we were very doubtful about the success of our event, some of which was to take place in the open air. However, mid-morning, clouds began to clear, as we made our way to the daily service of remembrance in the chapel, and, by midday, we had blue skies and brilliant sunshine, as we took our seats in the RAF grove. We had arranged a flyover by a Stearman biplane, the type in which our fathers did their primary training in the Arizona desert. There was barely a dry eye in the company as the aircraft completed several passes and a wing wiggle above us, as a start to our ceremony. The plaque was unveiled by an original pilot, now 99 years old, an Air Commodore in full RAF regalia, and a member of Mesa City Council. A priest, whose father had also been a pilot, gave a blessing. There followed a prayer, and some poems. I was privileged to read the passage from Isaiah, chapter 40, which contains the words: "They shall rise on wings, like eagles", which are printed on memorial plaques in Arizona and on our plaque at the NMA.


"We then retired for a lovely buffet lunch, followed by a tour of the extensive grounds and marvellous memorials in their land train, and then plenty of tea, cake and chat! Our event made top billing on BBC Midlands evening news that night!

Next year will mark the 80th Anniversary of the closure of the British Flying Training Schools in the USA at the end of the war, and a group of us plan to fly out to Arizona. Our visit will include attendance at the annual Memorial Service in Mesa Cemetery, which the Americans still hold, to honour the 23 cadets and 2 instructors who died during training, and are buried out there. Our 10 hour flight will be in marked contrast to the five days at sea, and the five days by rail that our fathers took to get there!

It is a great relief to know that there will be a permanent memorial in this country to these young men. Our fathers would never have expected this, but we hope they are pleased.

As a former World War 2 pilot has said: "It's not about medals. It's not about who shot down what. It's not about the thank-yous, but it's nice to be remembered because being remembered covers everybody who fought, flew and served in the war".

Buses run four times a day between Haddington and Aberlady. The earliest departure from Haddington is at 07:10 in the morning, and the last departure from Haddington is at 15:53 which arrives into Aberlady at 16:22. All services run directly with no transfers required, and take on average 30 minutes.

TURTLES AT MIDNIGHT

In the 1980's Ken and I and son Colin, aged 7, lived in Sri Lanka for almost three years. Ken was Project Director on the building of a brand new 5 Star Ramada hotel right in the middle of Colombo. There were many hotels being built at that time, but building was interrupted by the Tamil Riots.

After some time, the rioting subsided and work then could get underway. We were given an invitation to spend a weekend at the German owned Robinson's Club on the south west coast. The idea was to compare building projects as this hotel was on a "soft opening".

After a long drive down the west coast from Colombo we reached Robinson's Club and were welcomed very warmly. Colin was straight in the pool and we very quickly made ourselves at home. After dinner that night, one of the waiters asked if we would like to be woken up if turtles appeared on the beach to lay their eggs. Naturally we said 'yes'. Sure enough, just after midnight there was a knock on our bedroom door and we were told that a Loggerhead turtle was coming out of the sea. We gathered up a very sleepy Colin and made our way to the beach. There, to our complete amazement, was a turtle laboriously making a very large hole in the sand. When the hole was big enough she about turned and laid her eggs into the hole. I believe they lay over a hundred eggs at one time. Then the turtle covered the eggs with sand and filled the hole, later making a return to the sea. The Loggerhead was massive, about a metre in length. Such a graceful creature in the sea but such a slow and ungainly creature on land. We were absolutely thrilled to witness this truly wonderful sight.

The following morning, a bit tired with interrupted sleep, we went for breakfast and the "order of the day" was Scrambled Eggs on toast. We both told the waiter that this was the best scrambled eggs we had ever eaten. "Ah! turtle eggs, Madam!"

The tragedy is that many of the locals were aware of this and stole many of the eggs. However, there is much more control of this now.
