By the time you receive this newsletter we will already be approaching the start of Lent on 5th March and looking forwards to another busy period as we make plans for the Easter services.


In amongst all this busyness, all this coming and going, I pray that you will always find time for worship, prayer and reading God's word. As you do so, always remember the words of Psalm 121:

I have been back in Scotland for a week and the temperature difference between here and Tenerife was marked. Going from 22 to -2 has been a bit of a shock! I hope as well, you all came through Eonwe ok. Our near neighbours lost some roof ridge tiles and slates but otherwise are ok.

Whilst away in the village of San Blas, I went for a wander and came across the local Roman Catholic chapel. Trying to understand the various notices in Spanish, I saw the one below in English. The local Anglican church doesn't have a meeting place of its own, rather it uses the Roman Catholic chapel. The Roman Catholic chapel is generous enough to share their space with their brothers and sisters who do not have space of their own. I've often met people who think all the different branches of Christianity are different faiths and enjoy telling them we are actually different branches of the same faith. God is so big, no human being can grasp the entirety of God which has led to different denominations highlighting different aspects of God that they connect with. Another analogy I've seen used is that of a football team. We all play different positions within the same team. Paul used the analogy of a body made up of different parts. "Just as a body, though one, has many parts, but all its many parts form one body, so it is with Christ." I Corinthians 12:12.

It is good to remember we are one body, we are billions and we are all over this world.



Message from Finance Committee

We are very grateful for all the financial contributions which members make to the running of the church, whether by standing order or through cash donations. Costs continue to rise across the board, as we are all too aware: inflation in the UK has risen about 23% in the last 5 years. With this in mind, we would ask members to review the level of their giving and, if affordable, consider increasing standing orders to reflect our higher costs.

Standing orders are the most efficient way to support the church financially as we can claim gift aid quite easily on these. If you would like church bank account details and gift aid forms, please contact Morag Black or Kaye Macaskill.

Data Protection

In accordance with the Church of Scotland requirements and, as required by law under the General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR), Aberlady and Gullane Church is required to maintain stringent privacy and security of all personal data it holds on individuals - church members as well as those who have some connection with our church which require us to hold personal data.

For example, if you are on our Church "Roll of Members", the data we hold is typically your name, address, email address, telephone number and perhaps, if you have transferred your church membership from another church, the details of that transfer - the date and from which church you transferred. Since the GDPR regislation was introduced, all members, whether admitted by Profession of Faith or by Certificate of Transfer, are required to give written consent to their personal data being held by us.

You should be aware that the information we do hold, we hold only for the purpose of being able to contact you. This means that if you receive "Connect" magazine, either a physical copy or and electronic copy, (and presumably, you do receive "Connect" if you are reading this!) then we hold personal information about you - at least your name, address and possibly your email address.

You are entitled to view the personal data we hold about you at any time.

It is important that the data we hold is accurate and up to date, and you are encouraged to notify us of any changes.

Thank you also to the Congregation for such positive feedback, to the singing, playing the musical instruments and the lovely Christmas attire.


I think everybody left Church with a spring in their step and The True meaning of Christmas... hope, joy, gratitude and Love.

Reflections on the Camino Portuges

Readers will probably know The Camino de Santiago, the Way of St James, is a network of pilgrims' routes to the Cathedral of Santiago de Compostela in Galicia in NW Spain. Tradition has it that the remains of St James the Apostle are buried there. How they reached this spot is another story. You can watch the film 'The Way'. You can read the late John Brierley's wonderful guide book. He suggests inner preparation as well as outer preparation. He urges you to find a spiritual purpose for taking it. He made it his business to research so many of the routes over an extended period. He estimates over 100,000 people make this journey every year.

You can choose to walk a section. We chose a self-guided option to walk a section of the Portuguese Way, starting from North of Porto, at Porrino, heading over 100km to Santiago. You need to walk over 100km to receive confirmation you have completed a section of the Camino.

We walked along roads, up and down hills and around pretty coastlines; the route is marked by discrete scallop shells at every point where you might ponder over the next turn. Fellow walkers, perhaps they saw themselves as pilgrims, were in front of you, behind you and at your lodgings and hostels. Perhaps they pre-booked, perhaps they did not. Most had a scallop shell hanging from their backpack. All would have their Credential Del Peregrine stamped at the beginning and end of every day to evidence their route and earn their certificate in Santiago. (Churches, restaurants and your hostel could all provide the stamp on the way.)

Some walkers were local; some had travelled from miles to start (e.g. Australia, Asia and the USA). Some had read about the Camino; some wanted the challenge. Walking over 500km from Lisbon to Santiago seemed like a challenge for two people we met. Some just wanted time to think, perhaps on their own, many taking John Bierley's advice. Whatever the reason it was astonishing how many arrived in Santiago every day.

The arrival on the last day seemed for most people to be one of the most emotional moments of their journey; the walk may have been too long; things may have gone wrong; suddenly you are facing this magnificent Cathedral with stunning buildings all around. Whatever your own emotions it is impossible not to be affected by the emotions displaced by the stream of arrivals emerging from all corners of the square, from all directions of the multitude of Caminos whether from North, East or South.

Whatever dimensions of the church you belong to and however committed or sceptical a Christian you might be, if you have arrived in time for the evening service for pilgrims in this Catholic edifice it is indeed a service to remember. It is a walk to remember. AD 17.1.2025
