From the Minister.

Dear Friends.

As I write this, we are only a few days from the start of Advent. This year seems to have just flown by because it has been so busy. This will be the third time I will celebrate the Christmas season with you, as I became your Minister at the start of Advent in November 2023, but it will be the last time I celebrate the birth of our Saviour with you as your minister, as I have decided to retire on 6 April next year, which will mark the 20th anniversary of my ordination as Minister of Word and Sacrament. As you may imagine, this was not an easy decision to make because I have enjoyed working with all of you and getting to know you.

One of the reasons I was drawn to apply to be your minister was the very fond memories I have of Aberlady and Gullane from a brief time I spent living here as a child. Those good memories have only been reinforced by the time I have spent here again. This is a truly beautiful area of the world to live in, and I will take even more precious memories with me of this area and of all of you when I leave.

I told the Kirk Session a while ago about my decision and I felt it was best for the news to slowly spread rather than making an announcement that might come as a shock. So, many of you will by now have heard my news, but perhaps some of you will not yet have heard the very good news that Presbytery are thinking of allowing Aberlady and Gullane Church to call a full-time minister again after I leave. We will have confirmation of this after the next Presbytery meeting on 3 December.

The Kirk Session is progressing all our plans for our buildings and for future ideas of mission and hopefully we can bring you some news about these in our next issue of Connect. We have also reviewed the introduction of a second joint service every month and we feel that this is going well, so we will continue with this into the New Year.

I am presently in the process of registering to solemnise same sex marriages. This has taken quite a length of time since the initial enquiry I had about conducting a same sex marriage. Unfortunately, we couldn't take the booking for that wedding because we did not know how long the process would take. Once I have confirmation of my registration then both our church buildings will be registered as places where same sex marriage can be solemnised.

There are only eight weeks now until Christmas, and almost four weeks to the start of Advent. We have already had a planning meeting for our next All Age Worship Nativity service on 14 December and we hope it will be as well received as our Harvest Thanksgiving service because everybody has told me how much they enjoyed that service and the planning too. These services are a wonderful way for us all to get to know one another better, no matter what age, and to worship our Lord together.

Tempus fugit – time flies – "Everything on earth has its own time and its own season. God makes everything happen at the right time. Yet none of us can ever fully understand all he has done, and he puts questions in our minds about the past and the future. I know the best thing we can do is to always enjoy life, because God's gift to us is the happiness we get from our food and drink and from the work we do. Everything God has done will last forever; nothing he does can ever be changed. God has done all this, so that we will worship him." (Ecc 3:1 & 11-14).

As we come to worship Christ the new-born King (Hymn 324) I hope you have a lovely Christmas time and that you are all truly blessed in the New Year.

We invite God to heal, accompany, bless and be with people through our prayers. Isaiah 55:1 "Come, all you who are thirsty, come to the waters; and you who have no money, come, buy and eat!" is reflected in Matthew 11:28 where Jesus says, "Come to Me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest" yet we have no idea how many actually responded. Invitation is our business, response we leave to the individual and to God.

With that in mind, we are encouraging everyone who attends our churches to invite someone else every week. Is that something you could do? Likewise, we invite everyone to pray for the people of this world with all the difficulties it contains as well as for situations closer to home. Pray that God would send His Spirit. One of the most beautiful things about the invitation to be part of God's family is it will not wear out or run out; it is eternal. God Bless.

East Lothian Foodbank provides a crisis food and essentials service. It continues to see consistently high levels of need throughout the year from people in our community who have been left without enough money to live on. We need your donations.

Aberlady and Gullane Parish Church are proud to support East Lothian Foodbank.



This year our Harvest Thanksgiving Services donated 158kgs of food items and £75.15 in cash to the Foodbank.

DID YOU KNOW East Lothian Foodbank also offer a MONEY ADVICE SERVICE. With 2 advice workers and a Financial Inclusion Officer based at the Foodbank overseeing the project. In the financial year 24/25, 269 people were supported, giving 216 people more money to live on. A total of £195,006 back in people's pockets.

East Lothian Foodbank's Vison for the future is a community FREE FROM POVERTY where everyone has HOPE FOR THE FUTURE. Their mission is to provide emergency food and daily essentials for those without enough money to live on; to work with the community partners in providing effective advice and support for those living with financial hardship; and to influence policy towards the eradication of poverty in East Lothian.

Volunteers uplift donations for the Foodbank from Gullane and Aberlady Churches, Aberlady Community Hall, Gullane Library and Gullane COOP during opening hours. There is also a collection point at North Berwick Tesco. All donations are taken to the warehouse in Tranent where they are sorted and made into 3-day emergency food parcels. Parcels are delivered throughout East Lothian.

Usefulness.

Let's have a look at Paul's letter to Philemon verses 10 and 11.

'I appeal to you for my son Onesimus, who became my son while I was in chains. Formerly he was useless to you, but now he has become useful both to you and to me'.

I enjoy puns. Here are a couple of examples:

'I used to be a banker but I lost interest'.

'I'm an archaeologist and my life is in ruins'.

In the above verses from Paul's letter to Philemon there is a pun, but it's not obvious. It has to do with the bondservant Onesimus, who was in the process of being returned to Philemon, a wealthy Christian living in Colossae. Evidently Onesimus had stolen money or property from Philemon, fled to Rome, heard the gospel through Paul and become a believer in Jesus. In this short letter Paul appeals to Philemon to take Onesimus back not as a *bondservant* but as a 'beloved brother in Christ'.

Where's the pun? Crucially, the meaning of the name Onesimus is *useful* and Paul is appealing to Philemon to take him back because he is now *useful* having been *useless*. We don't know the end of the story but I'd like to think that Onesimus was received by Philemon with open arms. We don't know if Onesimus ever had opportunity to read Paul's letter but if he did he would have been delighted and thankful to be described as useful given the back story.

I wonder if we see ourselves as being useful. The temptation is to equate usefulness with practical abilities and skills, to think of usefulness in purely utilitarian terms. In church life it's easy to view others and their gifts as being more important than ourselves. It's tempting to write ourselves off because we can't (fill in the blank) like (fill in the name).

I don't believe that God sees usefulness in those terms. God looks beyond the external and looks at the heart. It's not primarily about what we do as much as who we are becoming in

Christ. Rather than compare myself with others and their gifts perhaps I could ask myself questions like:

'Am I learning to love God with all my heart soul and mind?'

'Am I learning to love others?'

'Am I learning to follow Jesus on a daily basis?

'Am I learning to be available to God?'

'Am I learning to pray'?

I'm using the word *learning* intentionally – it underlines that we are in *process*, not yet the finished article and sad to say we tend to focus on what we *are not* and what we *don't have*, rather than on the person God has made us to be and the gifts he has given us. Often, our default position is to write ourselves off because of our age, our background, our gender, our personality type or our education. (Add your own perceived disqualification!) We need a different mindset.

Like Onesimus, each of us is useful in Christ and we should remember that *God doesn't call* the qualified, he qualifies the called.



Book review.

Barefoot in a burn, under the stars in Iona, in the silence of a Quaker meeting or surrounded by intricate artwork and ritual in an Orthodox cathedral, the interviews and pen-portraits in this new book chart the many and unexpected ways that young people are discovering or

rediscovering their Christian faith in the UK today. Published earlier this year by Bloomsbury, *Don't Forget We're Here Forever* is a beautifully written and insightful memoir of the author's travels around the country and her own wrestle with faith. There are signs that some young people are turning away from materialism and individualism and looking for something (and someone) greater that has been missing from their lives. I found so much beauty in this book and also so many challenging questions. The author asks: 'if they never enter a church, how will the next generation discover what it might do for



them.... and... just because we don't need them all the time [like a hospital or fire station], it doesn't mean [a church's] community role becomes defunct'. Previous generations all had the opportunity to opt into or out of Christianity. A question that vexes me is: what of the young British people today who miss out on any opportunity to experience anything of the Christian faith that was so available to previous generations?

I recommend this as a Christmas gift for anyone who likes beautiful, well-researched writing and thinking about the future. Do you have a book review or recommendation you would like to share? Send it in!

Make Christmas sweeter.

According to Oxfam, up to 9 out of 10 Ghanaian and Cote d'Ivoire cocoa farmers don't earn a living income, so it's commonplace to rely on child labour. They grow about 70% of the world's cocoa. That means we've all almost definitely eaten chocolate made by child labour. What can we do? Where possible buy value-added-at-source chocolate (i.e. where it is processed in country, keeping more benefit for the local people). Buy Fairtrade (but don't be fooled by generally unfit own-brand sustainability schemes. Where possible avoid the mega multinationals – Lindt, Mars, Mondelez (Cadburys, Terry's, Toblerone), Nestle and Ferrero. Consider www.meaningfulchocolate.co.uk for advent calendars, Easter eggs and more that include the Christian Message. **Katie McM.**
